#### Mile Bluff Medical Center - Mauston, WI

I had an eight-week clinical rotation at Mile Bluff Medical Center in Mauston, Wisconsin. It was a positive eight weeks full of unique clinical experiences and learning opportunities. Mile Bluff is a rural level 3 trauma center with 3 operating rooms managed by four CRNAs. The CRNAs practice independently to their full scope of practice. As an SRNA with experience only in medically directed practices, I quickly learned that I had unique autonomy with patient care. The CRNAs were fantastic teachers and challenged me to develop the mindset of an independent CRNA. The operating room staff was great to work with and helpful when I needed an extra hand or had a question about the facility. I had the opportunity to do a few things that I have not been able to do at any previous site, including pre-anesthetic clinic evaluations, Bier blocks, clearing patients post-op, and post-op rescue blocks. I also had the opportunity to facilitate an in-service on local anesthetic systemic toxicity for the Pre-op, PACU, and OR nursing staff. Surgeons at this facility have respect for the CRNAs and trust their patient care plan. Overall, I am thankful for my time at Mile Bluff Medical Center and I am confident this experience will make me a better CRNA.


